Nancy Abelman is an Associate Professor of Anthropology and East Asian Languages and Cultures and Director of the Center for East Asian and Pacific Studies at the University of Illinois. She is also a teaching faculty member of Asian American Studies. She has published books on social movements in contemporary South Korea (*Echoes of the Past, Epics of Dissent: A South Korean Social Movement*, 1996); on Korean America (*Blue Dreams: Korean Americans and the Los Angeles Riots*, with John Lie, 1995); and on women and social mobility in post-colonial South Korea (*The Melodrama of Mobility: Women, Talk and Class in Contemporary South Korea*, 2003). She will be speaking on her current book project, which is based on 4 years of transnational ethnography on the educational trajectories of Korean American public college students (in Illinois) as they articulate with the educational histories of their émigré parents.

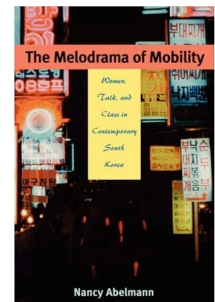
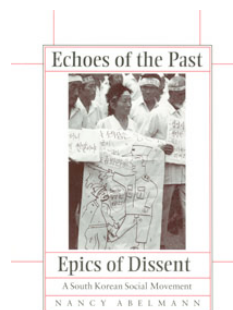
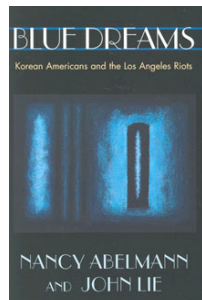
